

Monitoring on open science and research in Finland

- The 2022 <u>monitoring on</u> <u>open science and research</u> has been completed.
 - 14 Universities
 - 23 U of Applied
 Sciences
 - 10 Research Institutes
- Most organisations reached outstanding level 5 of openness.
- All results are available in Research.fi service

JISC-TSV Sherpa/Romeo project


- Jisc and TSV are <u>collaborating</u> to encourage journals and publishers in Finland to register and update their open access policies in Sherpa Romeo.
- ~330 potential journals published in Finland, of which 78 were already in Sherpa Romeo.
- As of 2022, registering OA policy to Sherpa Romeo is required of journals applying for government subsidies publishing from TSV.
- Jisc and TSV communicate criteria, translate instructions, and organise workshops for training and preparing applications.
- The collaboration runs until December 2022.


The renewed <u>JUFO portal</u> now provides more diverse information about:

FinELib 2022 – an update

- In addition to TA's, increased focus on (and agreements with) fully OA publishers
- First consortium-level agreement with diamond OA publisher (OLH)
- New agreements to support key OA infrastructure via SCOSS (arXiv, DSpace)
- Updated licensing principles (requirements):
 - Immediate 100 % OA: OA journals, TAs or self-archiving AAMs with CC BY and 0-embargo
 - o CC BY: must be provided
 - Copyright: author must retain
 - Agreement value can't diminish (e.g. flipping journals should remain eligible)
- Promoting OA cost monitoring
- A new data analyst



FinELib 2023?

- Projects on data and OA books
- A separate project on smaller, non-profit scholarly publishers:
 - o data-driven approach, new agreements
- Preparing for the post-2024 landscape:
 - Where do we want to go as a consortium?
 - Tools, skills, mindsets etc.?
- Publishing in hybrid journals likely to plateau or go down (it already does), while publishing in fully OA journals likely to proliferate further
 - National and institutional policies & institutional OA funds
 - Implications in terms of OA? And in terms of costs?
